## Organizers

The Principles for Responsible Management Education (PRME) is a United Nations-supported initiative founded in 2007 to raise the profile of sustainability in academic institutions around

the world. The PRME Working Group on Anti-Corruption was established in 2008. Its purpose is to incorporate the anti-corruption principles of the United Nations Global Compact (UNGC) into academic and business discourse. Since then, the group has grown into a dynamic community that collaborates to promote integrity and combat corruption in the public, private, academic, and nonprofit sectors. The Working Group's activities align with the seven Principles of PRME. In the area of teaching, the group develops best practice guidelines and promotes curriculum changes that integrate a business ethics approach with compliance as a fundamental component. In the area of research, the group promotes and disseminates knowledge about business ethics, integrity, and transparency from a practical perspective. The group aims to address the needs of the business community in implementing the 10<sup>th</sup> Principle of the UNGC, to contextualize discussions of these issues within specific geographic regions, and to provide practitioners with concrete tools to help them establish, enhance, and monitor effective ethics and compliance programs.

The PRME Business Integrity Action Center (BIAC) at the University of Applied Sciences of the Grisons has extensive experience conducting interdisciplinary research projects and hosting events. The event's topic lies at the intersection of the center's fields of competence "Corporate Responsibility" and "Internationalization." As an agile university, the University of Applied Sciences of the Grisons relies on dynamic thinking and proactive action. With this mindset, the university courageously and sustainably shapes the future. The university educates its more than 2,300 students to become highly qualified and responsible leaders. The university offers bachelor's, master's, and continuing education programs in architecture, civil engineering, computer and data science, mobile robotics, multimedia production, photonics, service innovation and design, supply chain management, tourism, and management. Teaching and research at the university are interdisciplinary and focused on practical business and societal challenges. In 2009, the University of Applied Sciences of the Grisons (FHGR) became the first public Swiss university to sign the Principles for Responsible Management Education (PRME). Since 2014, it has been a recognized member of the PRME Champion leadership group.

The United Nations Global Compact (UNGC) is the world's largest corporate sustainability initiative, calling on companies to align with ten universally accepted principles. Central to its mission is Principle 10, which mandates that businesses work against all forms of corruption, including extortion and bribery. Rooted in the UN Convention Against Corruption, the UNGC's governance portfolio emphasizes transformational governance—an approach that urges companies to be ethical, inclusive, and transparent while strengthening the public institutions and systems that underpin long-term success. A key strategy is Collective Action, where businesses join forces with governments and civil society to level the playing field, enhance compliance standards, and create fair market conditions worldwide. Through toolkits, local networks, and high-level calls to action, the UNGC empowers the private sector to drive systemic change and uphold integrity as a universal norm.

Founded in 2014, Ethics and Compliance Switzerland (ECS) is a nonprofit organization dedicated to fostering a robust ethics and compliance community across all sectors in

Switzerland. As the first NGO of its kind to connect professionals from the private and public sectors, ECS promotes the exchange of best practices, integrity, and high ethical standards. ECS serves as a platform for ethics and compliance officers, legal counsel, risk professionals, regulators, auditors, board members, and individuals working with or supervising compliance functions. ECS facilitates cross-sector dialogue through specialized working groups that cover critical domains such as anti-bribery, investigations, artificial intelligence (AI), and whistleblowing. ECS hosts conferences, webinars, and networking events to keep its members informed about the latest regulatory trends and governance challenges.
