The completed application must be submitted at the start of the semester and at least two months before any course assessment is made.

- A current report (no more than one year old) from an expert with details of:
 - Diagnosis according to the ICD-10 classification
 - Restrictions relevant to the study programme that result from your disability or chronic illness
 - Trend of your disability or chronic illness (stable, progressive, recurring, degenerative, etc.)
 - Recommendation of measures to offset the disadvantages you suffer from
 - Previous decisions on assistance measures (if available and for initial applications)

By signing this application for assistance measures, the applicant agrees that the relevant people will be informed for the purpose of the internal evaluations required. In addition, the decision will be stored in your student file. The application form for assistance measures at the University of Applied Sciences of the Grisons is based on the Guidelines on Assistance Measures.

Possible measures include:

- Use of technical equipment during examinations (e.g. laptop, reading device)
- Extension of examination time or submission deadline for written work
- Recovery breaks during exams that are not included in the examination time
- Taking exams in a separate room
- Option to withdraw from exams without suffering any consequences if you develop serious, acute symptoms (e.g. flare-ups in autoimmune diseases)
- Change in type of course assessment, e.g. oral rather than written exam or vice versa (e.g. for students with visual impairment or speech impediments)
- Use of personal assistants (e.g. sign language interpreter)
- Changes to the infrastructure
